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Health care is continuously changing and necessitates adjustment for evolving roles and responsibilities of licensed health care providers and assistive personnel. The abilities to delegate, assign and supervise are critical competencies for every RN. It is important to note that states/jurisdictions have different laws and rules/regulations about delegation, and it is the responsibility of all licensed nurses to know what is permitted in their jurisdiction. When certain nursing care needs to be delegated, it is imperative that the delegation process and the jurisdiction NPA be clearly understood so that it is safely, ethically and effectively carried out. The decision of whether or not to delegate or assign is based upon the RN's judgment concerning the condition of the patient, the competence of all members of the nursing team and the degree of supervision that will be required of the RN if a task is delegated. The difference between **delegation** and **assignment** has been a source of debate for years.
